"I dress for myself, but it's hard to be your own person without getting strange looks from others," said Junior Lyz Latson.


Some clothes fade away in the fashion zone, while others stay hip for years. "I've always been most comfortable in Wrangler's," said Senior Lisa Rothlisberger.



"Being creative can drive you crazy sometimes," said Senior Loly Garza.


















