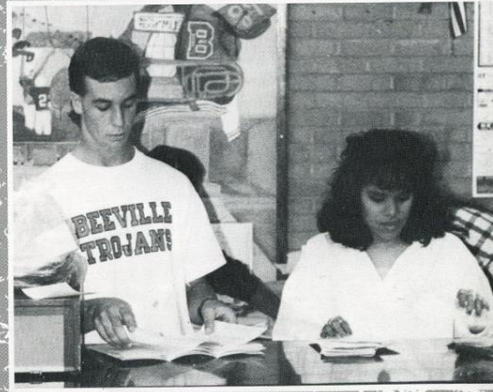

Everyone has problems at one time or another and they have to be solved somehow because they just won't go away. With a certain helping hand, things can be worked out.



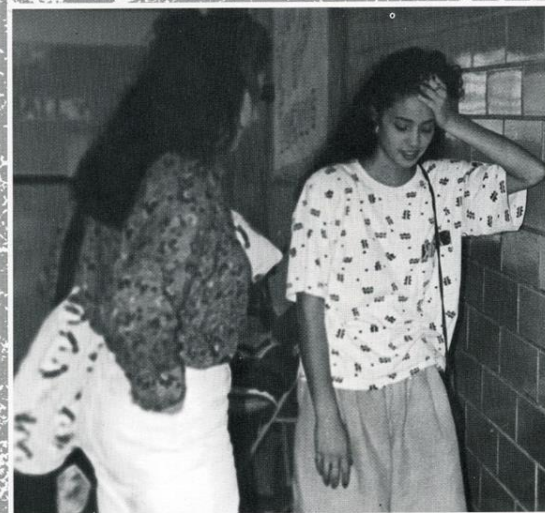

out of trouble.

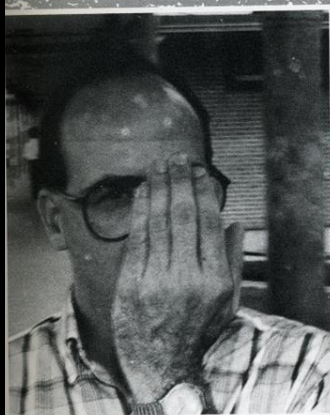
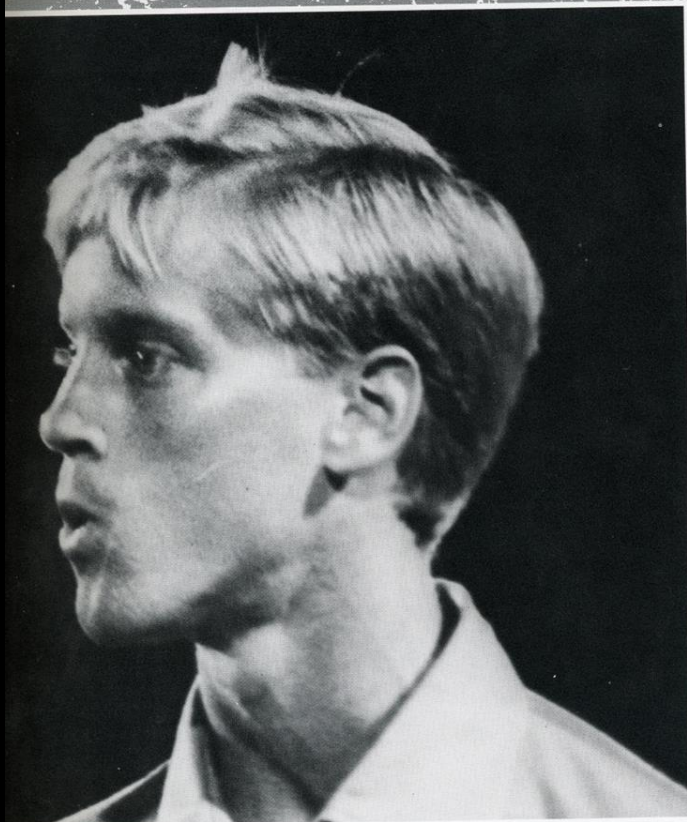
"While I was going to

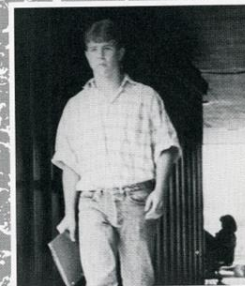

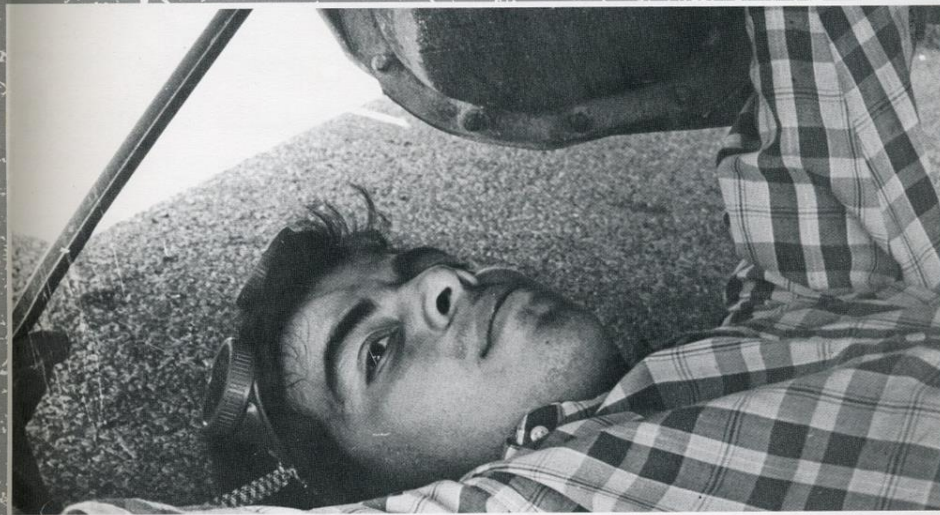
underclassmen will stay friends and not wind up with our noses in the air."

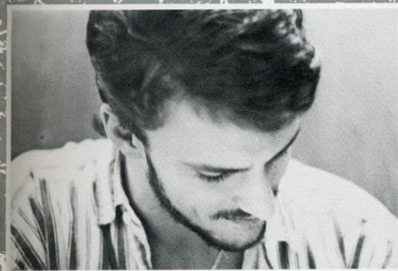

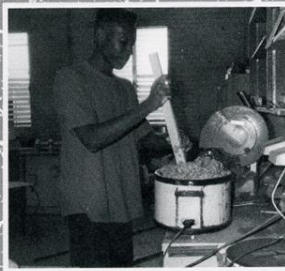




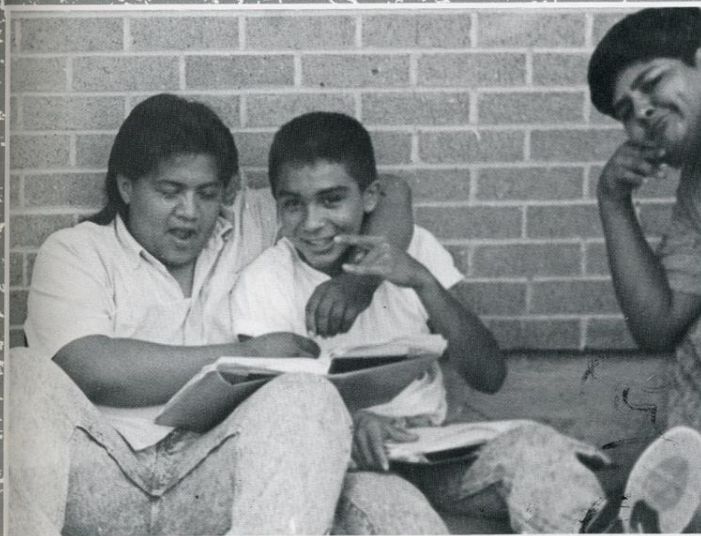

"Once football season ended, it was real hard for the girls to make it to practice," said drill team sponsor Cherissa Crawford. "They thought 'End of season, end of

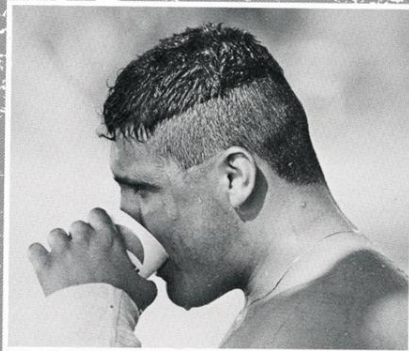
classes.'"

fighting.

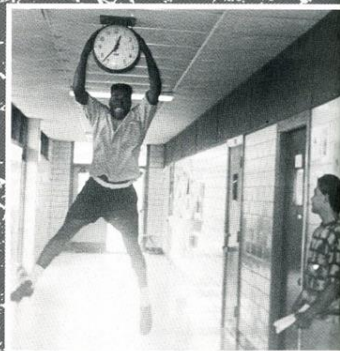
"He can always find a

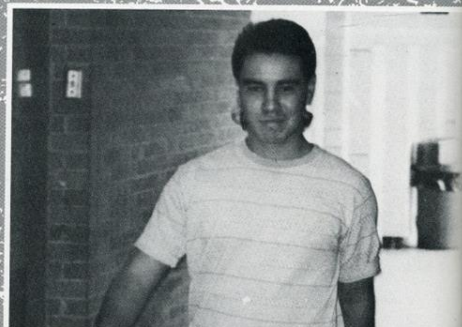
Students this year pushed themselves to the limit to succeed in athletics (the Cross-Country team took district honors) in

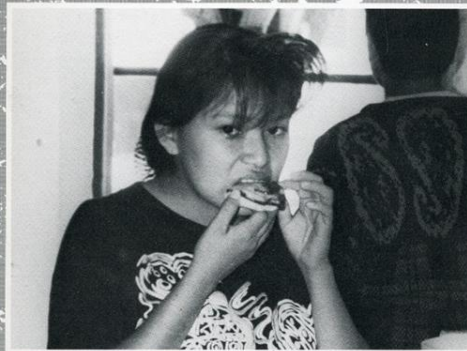

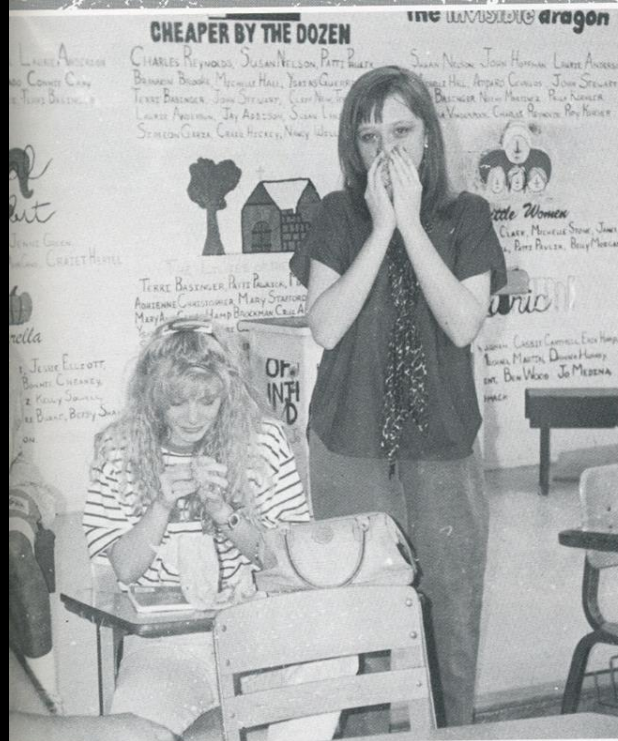
low to high and everyone knows what's going on."

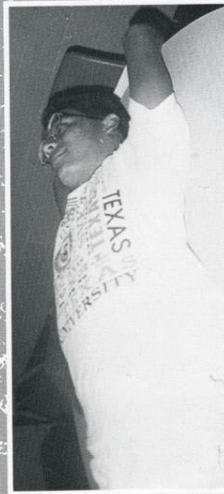

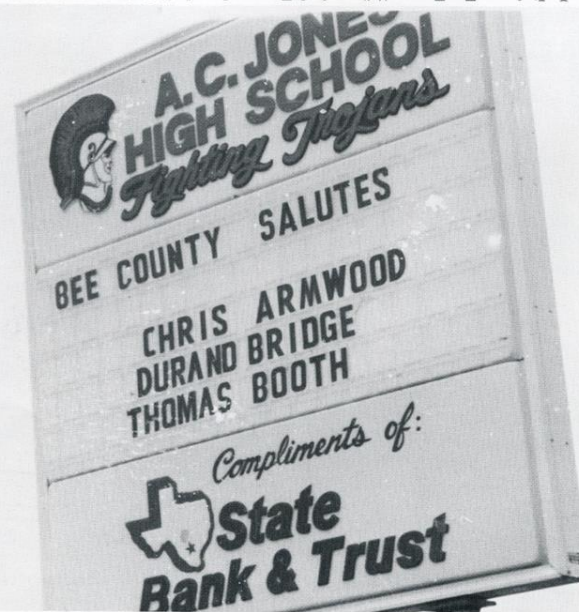

The picture to the left is a glimpse of the support given from Bee County to the troops of Operation Desert Storm, who were graduates of A.C. Jones High school.

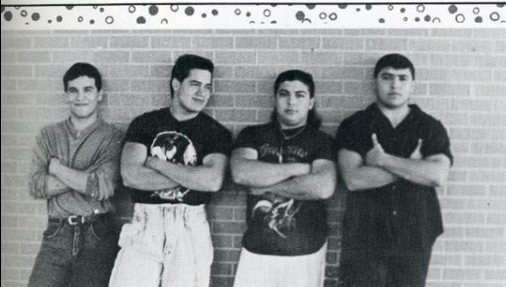

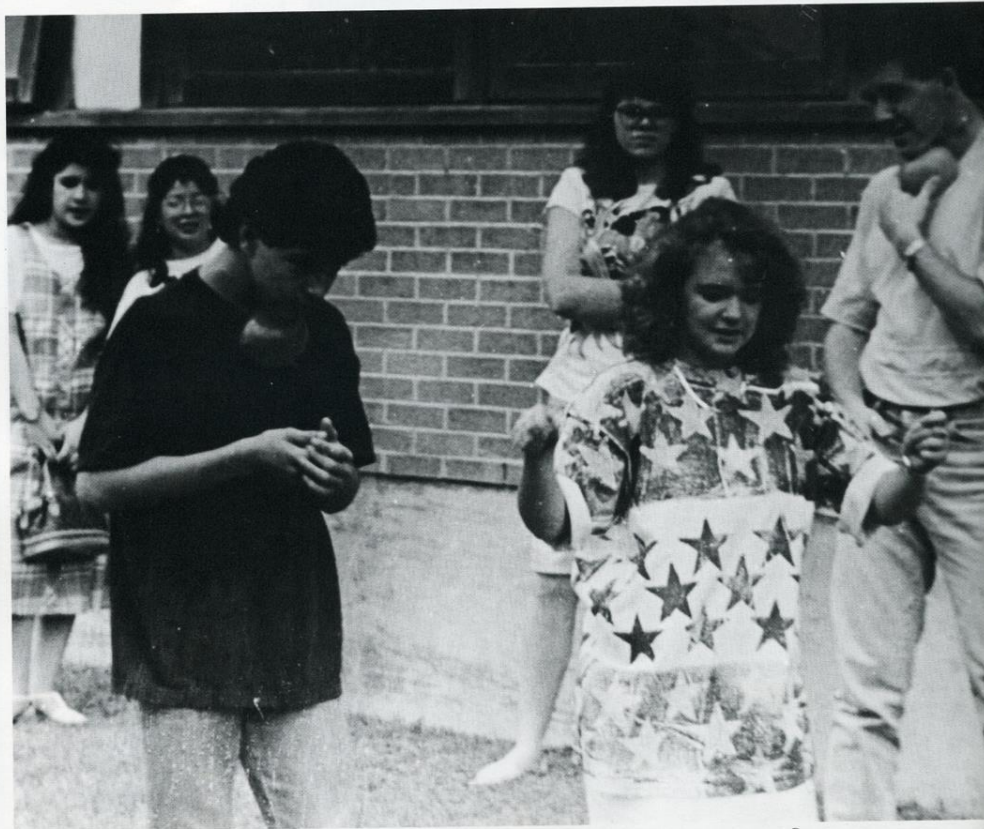

This year was the first time since the early '80's since the powder puff football game was played. The game pitted the Junior class girls against the Senior class girls but ended in a stale mate.

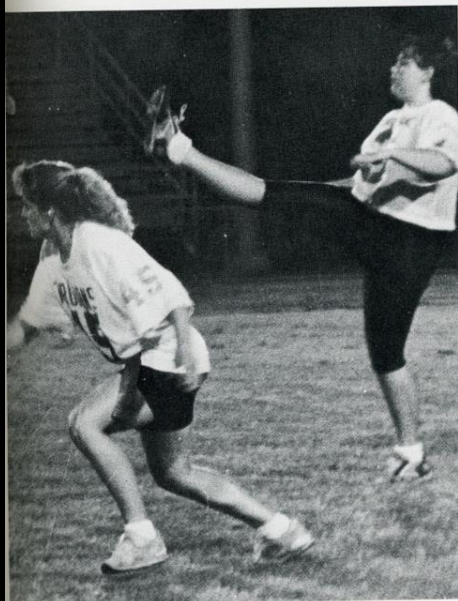
"We hadn't had a game since 1984 and the girls wanted to try it again for fun," said English I and Student Council

It doesn't really matter who wins or loses as long as there's good, clean, fun. -BT



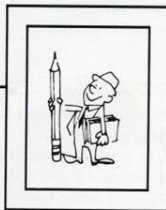



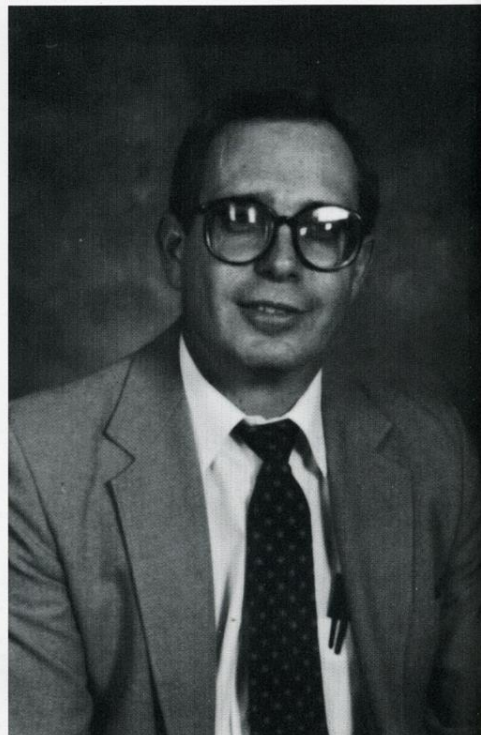

You have to have an interest to succeed, and be good at it. "As a classroom teacher, I felt I was doing a lot of counseling during, before and after class. It had

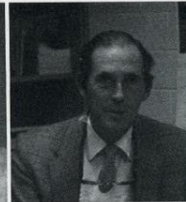
always been in the back of my mind, but I didn't know if I really wanted to go back to college . . . Anyway I finally did and here I am!" said *Mary Joy*.

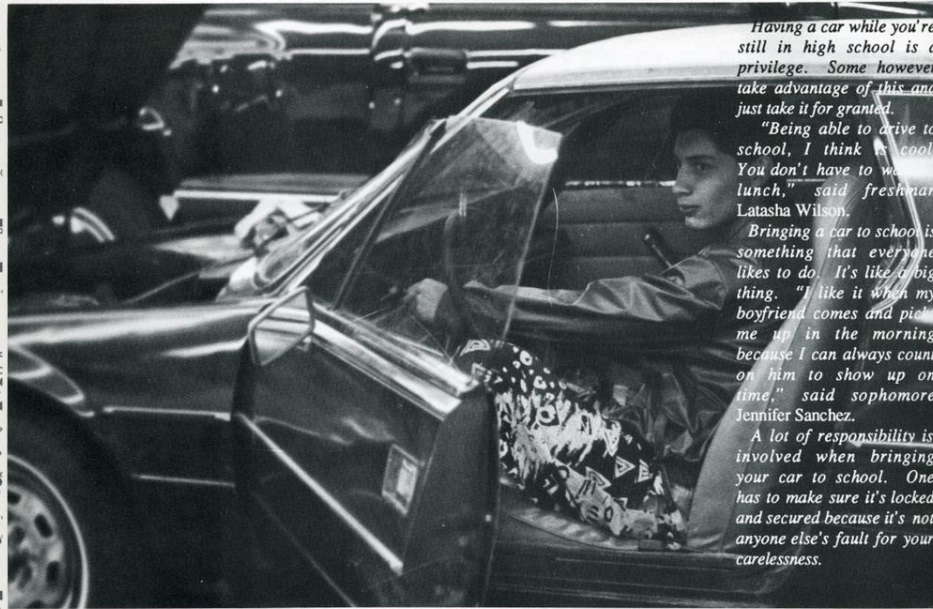

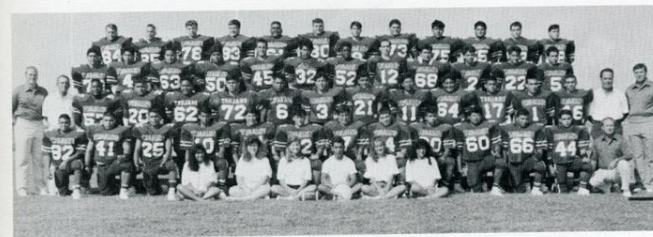

"This year got me ready for J.V. and Varsity," said Freshman *Lenny Landin* who's ready for

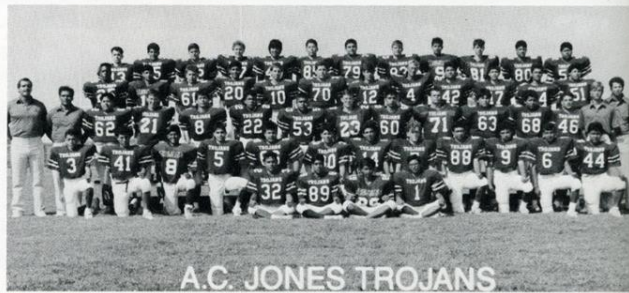
next year.

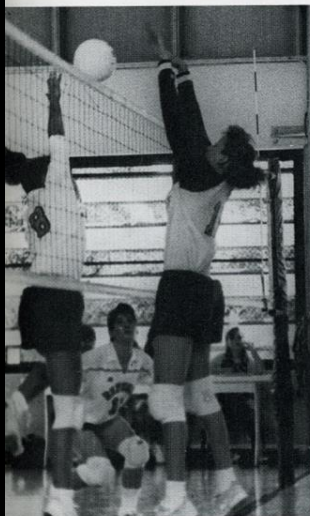

As for Freshman, despite many close defeats, they did try their hardest, and never gave up their hopes. At every game, they were ready to perform their duty.

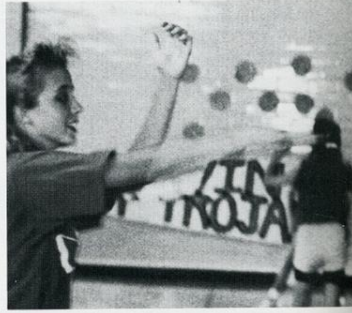
"It takes hard work and a lot of practice to be a better team," said Freshman *Terrie Esparza*.

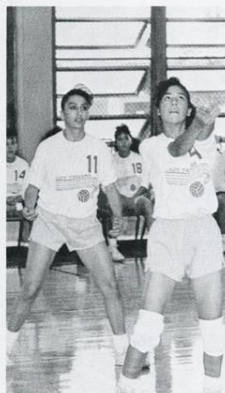

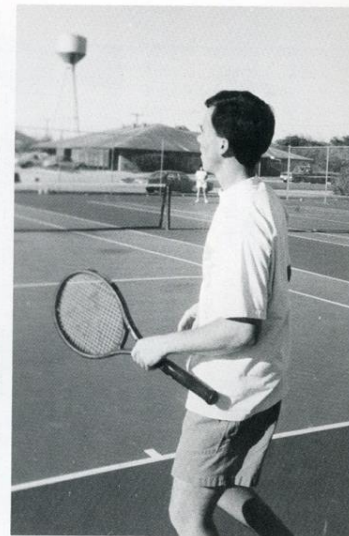

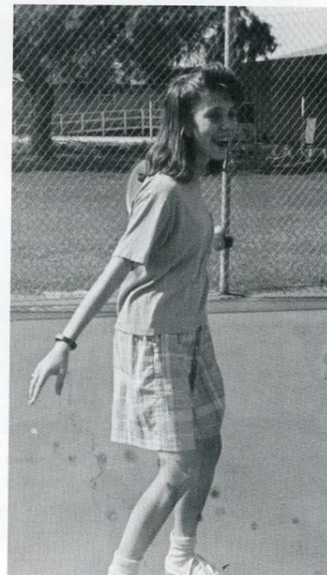

sophomore *Suzanne Howard*. So, how does the coach feel about this year's success story?

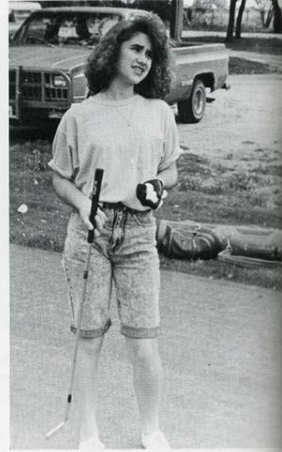

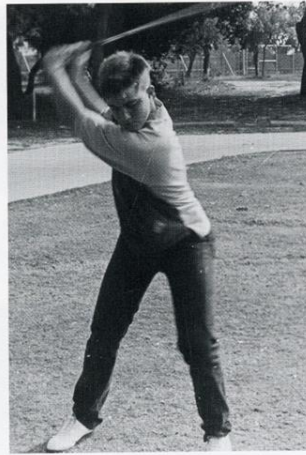

No one felt the defeat worse than senior *Tighe Cottle*. "I was extremely disappointed. We had that game won, yet it slipped away. It was very

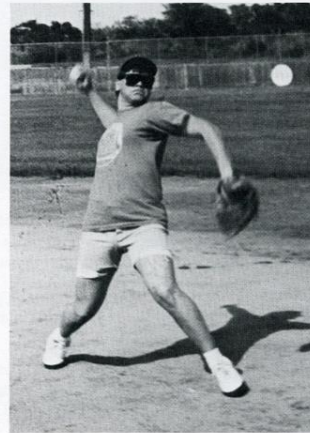
disheartening," said Cottle. Fellow teammate *Carlos Chamberlain* also was not impressed with the outcome but none the less he still said it was a "Heck of a game."

"If we all went to district, I think our attitudes would probably be the same. I think we handled all of the pressure that the press gave to us," said Senior *Jaime Martinez*.

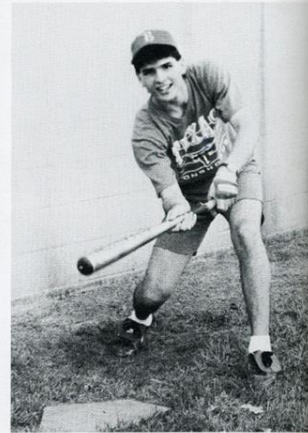

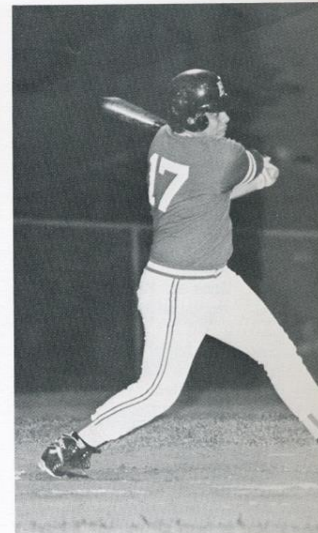

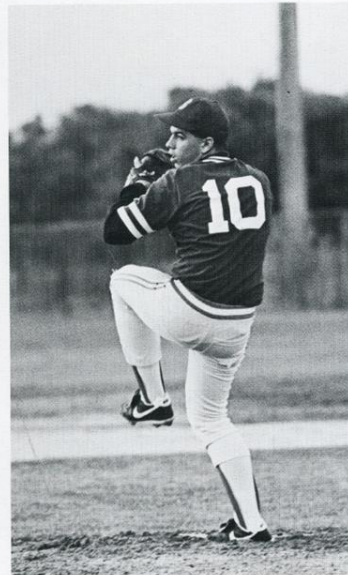

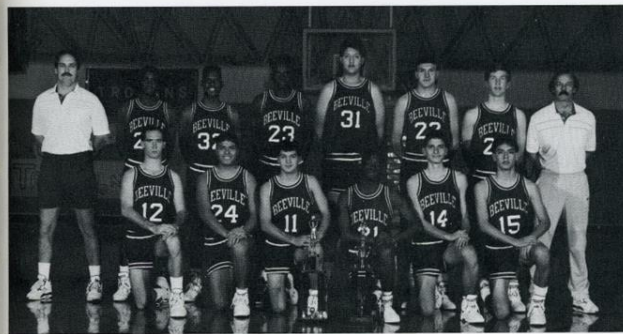

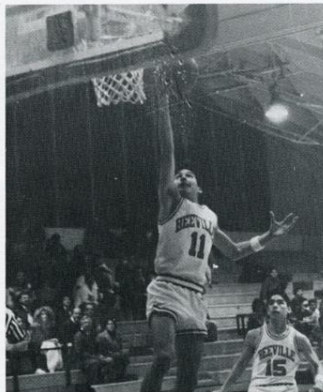

Many difficulties had to be overcome along the way as

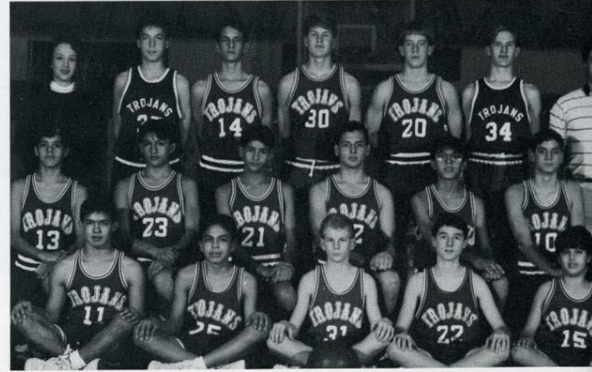
players got their game rhythm in sync. "I was called on a foul and it was not even my fault. It really made me mad," said freshman Bumper Gomez.

Self esteem in everyone is needed to bring up spirit on both student fans and team members!



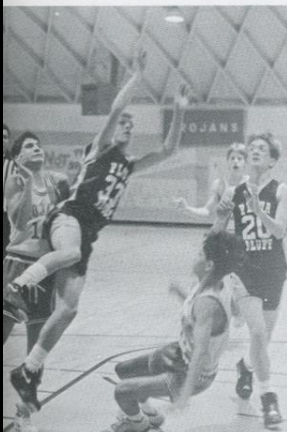

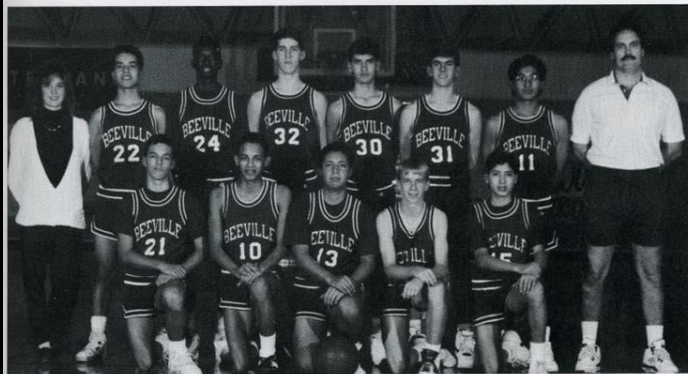

"I feel playing basketball does give me and the others a more positive and confident feeling about ourselves," said Flores.

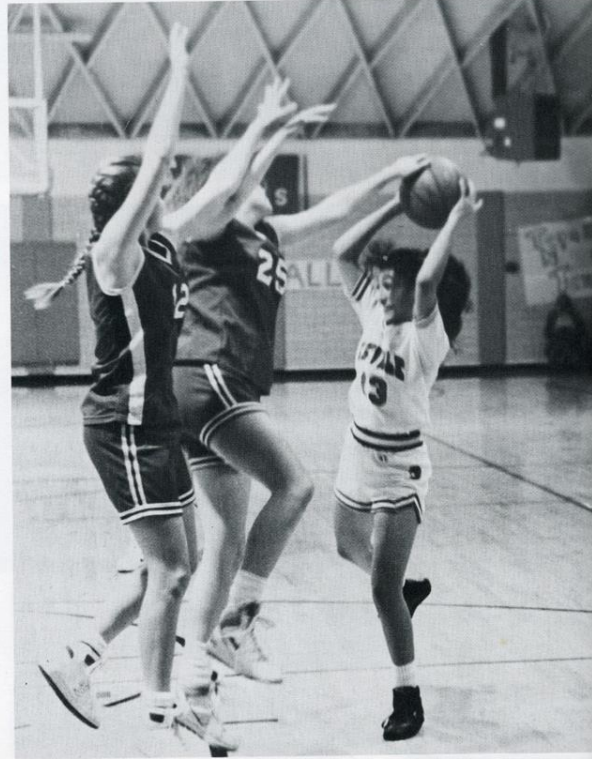

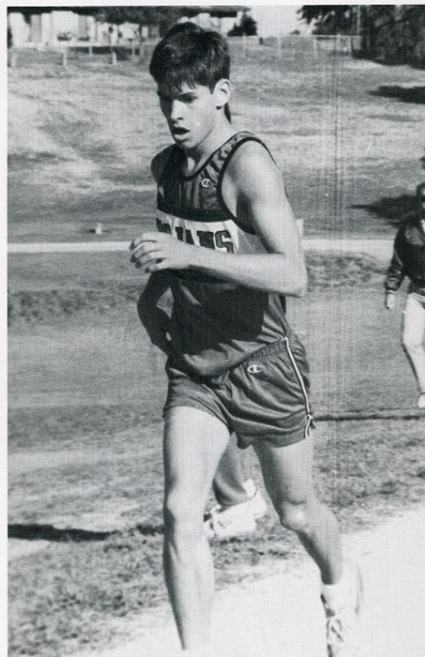

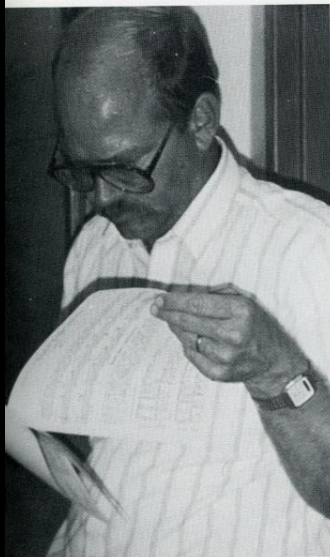

The school nurse told her students that the journalism advisor didn't know any better and had no journalistic experience or know-how whatsoever.

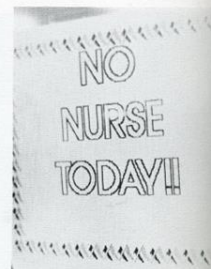
We knew better. Mr. Garner took over a chaotic program and put it back on track, we won several journalism tournaments, and was never late on a deadline.

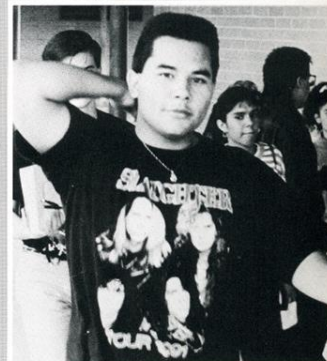

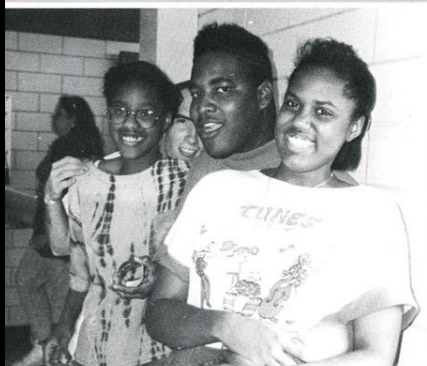

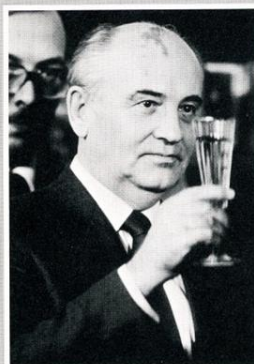
