

Sometimes, however, one does feel more safe talking to a parent. "I get along great with my dad, I always go to him when I have a problem," said Senior Joey Salinas.





"Once football season ended, it was real hard for the girls to make it to practice," said drill team sponsor Cherissa Crawford. "They thought End of season, end of


classes.""





low to high and everyone knows what's going on."














