






















What Happened in 1993-94

- 7. The great floods in the Midwest. St. Louis was hit particularly hard with several homes and businesses suffering extensive property damage due to the torrential rains.
- 8. The fighting in Bosnia.
- 9. Russian Parliament is disbanded.
- 10. Figure skater Nancy Kerrigan is struck in the knee at the U.S. National Championships by an attacker. The attacker turns out to be someone hired by Shawn Eckardt and Jeff Gillooly, the former bodyguard and husband of Kerrigan's rival Tonya Harding. 




