




























As this book goes to print, I am packing for China. I leave you, Beeville, with a few thoughts:


So, Trojans, it is up to you to continue. Pursue excellence; work hard; and produce something that you can take pride in.


A Season of Hardwork






A Great Year!


A Tribute to Marion Horton

By the time I got to my mother's room everyone was outside crying, so naturally I started to cry too. I still didn't know what was happening. I did know that it wasn't good.


We waited in the hall. The doctor walked out of the room and said that we could see her. We walked in slowly. When I saw my mother, she looked fine, but I knew that she wasn't.
