




CELEBRATION



ENDING ON A HIGH




varsity players remained intent on finishing the season hard work and discipline, the team

With the season done, sighs exhaled and uniforms turned in, players can anticipate greater expectations and more work to achieve the goal of winning.
















DEDICATION & COLOPHON


