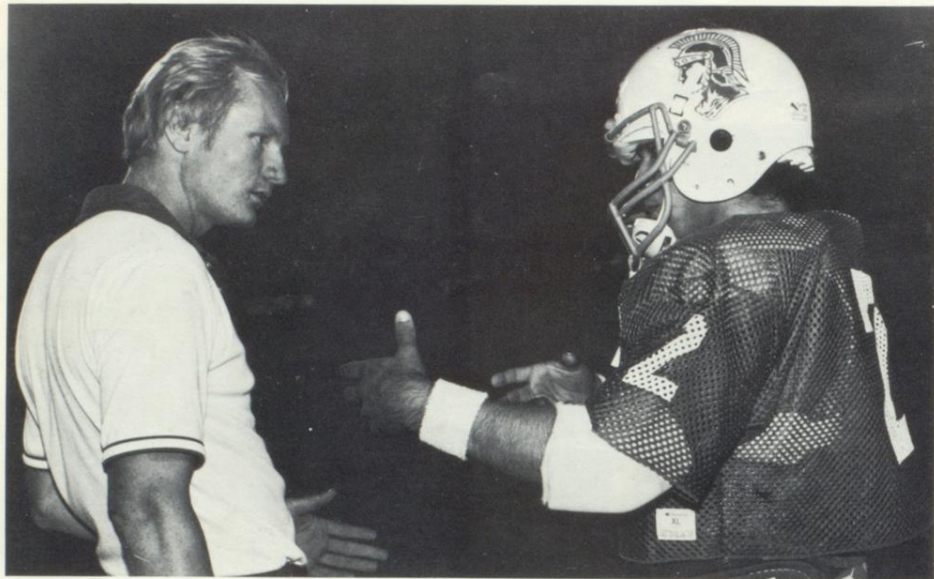

This year's Trojan Marching Band displayed its spirit and abilities at pep rallies, during the half-time of football games, at concerts, and at contests.

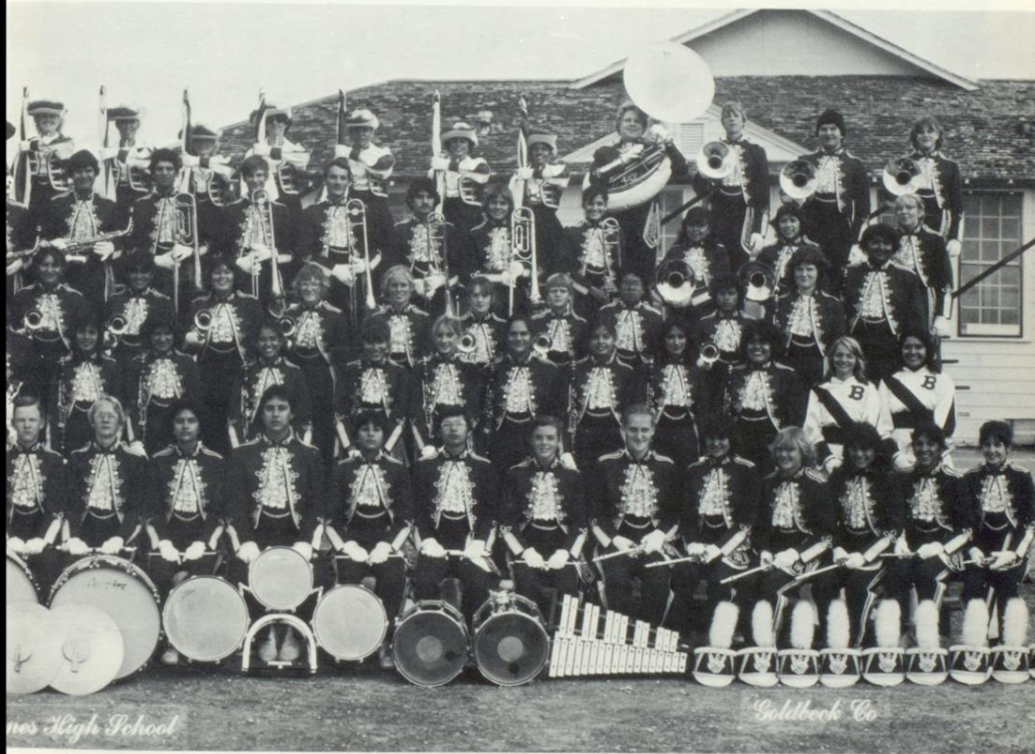

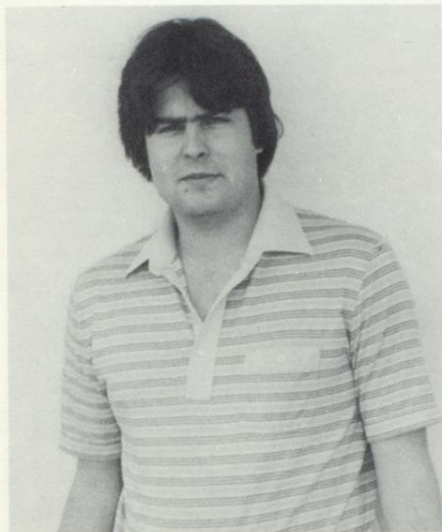

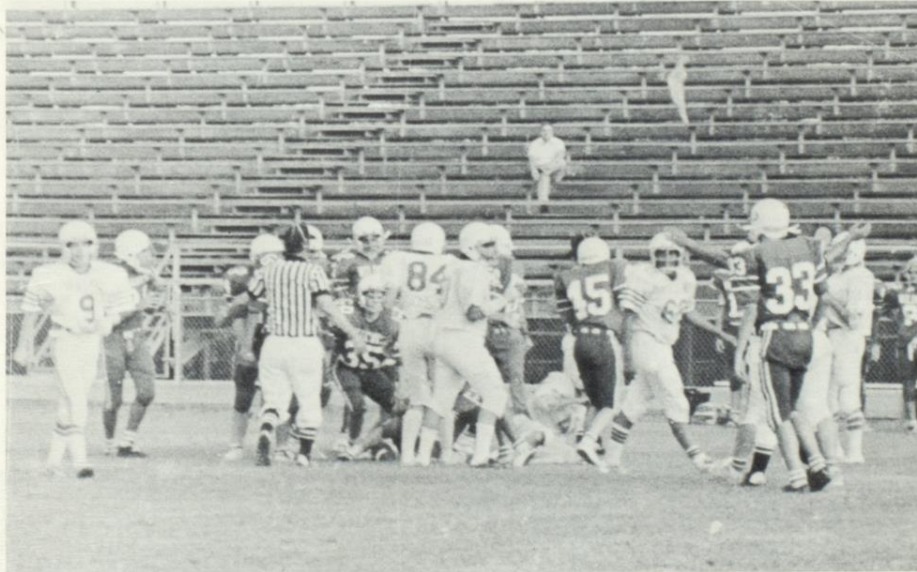

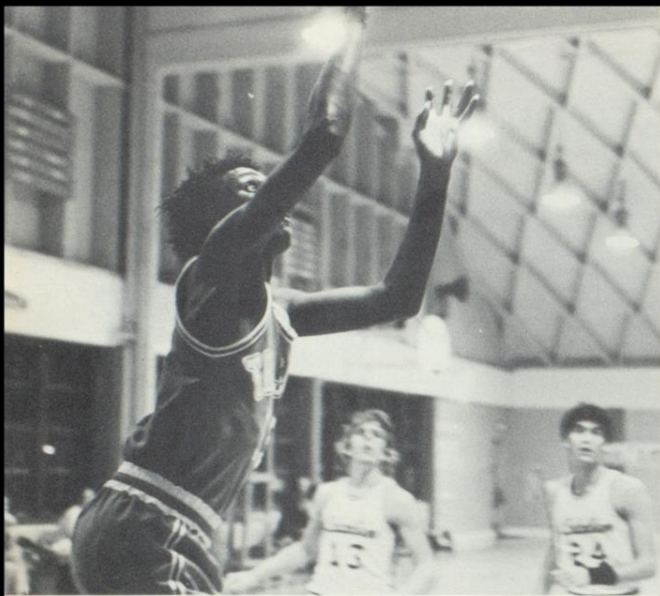

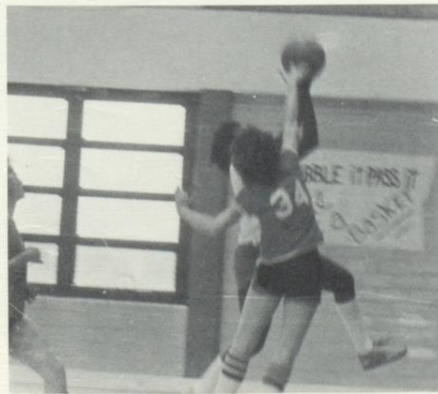

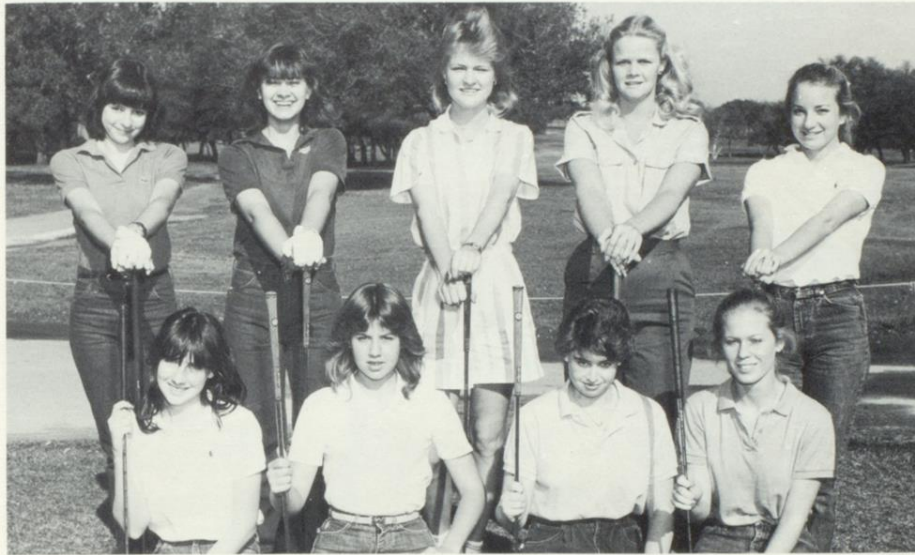

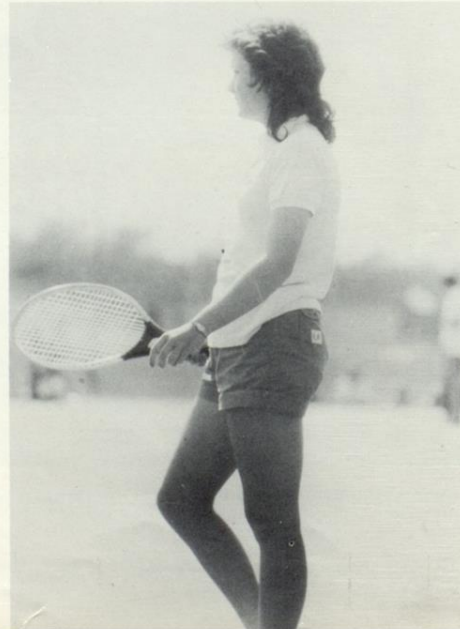

This year's track team started working out toward the end of December. It was not fully organized, but there were a few athletes working out. At the beginning of January, the varsity came together and began working out because they had to get in shape. This meant long distance type workouts so that they could get used to the strain on their bodies and expand their lungs to be able to breathe right.

Their schedule was hectic. On Mondays four 880's were run with about three minutes rest between each one and always a quarter for time afterwards. On Tuesdays, they ran twelve 220's with about one or two minutes rest between each and then a quarter. Wednesdays weren't any easier either. The team had to run two 880's and ten 110's on the curves and then a quarter. Thursdays, they ran 30 minutes continuously. Friday was a "challenge day." They could challenge each other for a race. Whoever won got the

other person's spot on the team. Their workouts were six quarters and then one for time. Their workouts for getting in shape meant splitting up hurdles, pole vaulting, high jumping, long jumping, and distance running.

The sprinters have different workouts. The varsity seniors workout from 2:30 to 3:30 and the juniors, sophomores, and freshmen from 3:30 to 4:30. Sometimes seniors had double workouts from 2:30 to 4:30.

The track workout for the distance men was easy at first, but then it got difficult. For the first two weeks they didn't have any trouble keeping up. On Mondays they ran five miles and from two to four 880's on Tuesdays. Wednesdays they ran five miles. Thursday they ran six 880's with three minutes rest and Friday they ran the whistle for two minutes up and down. This process takes approximately an hour to run. This is done until the district meet.

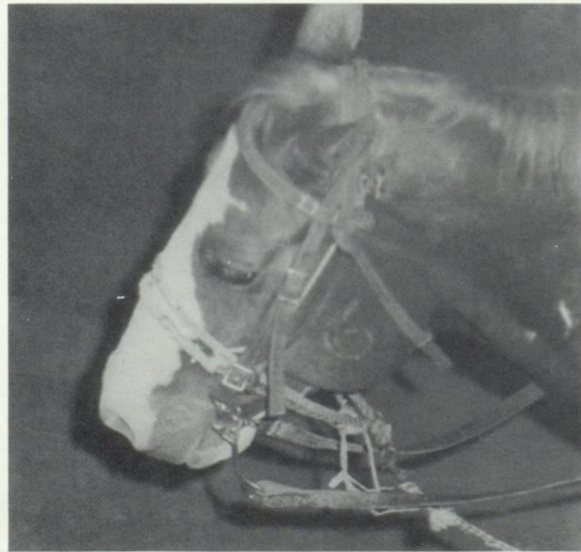

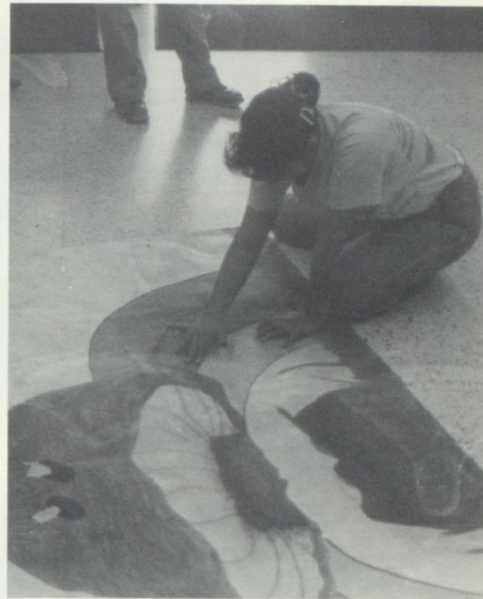

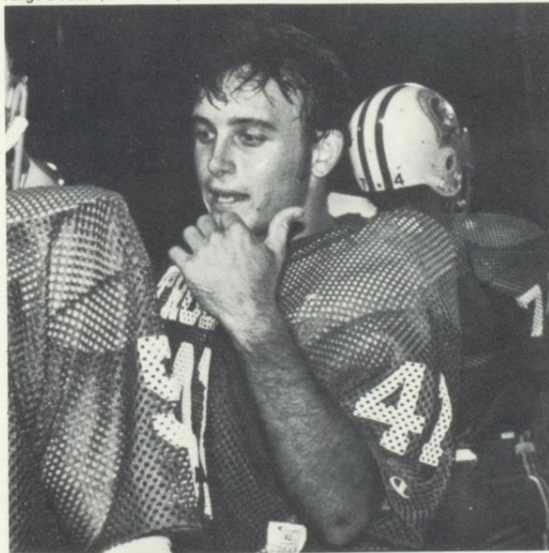

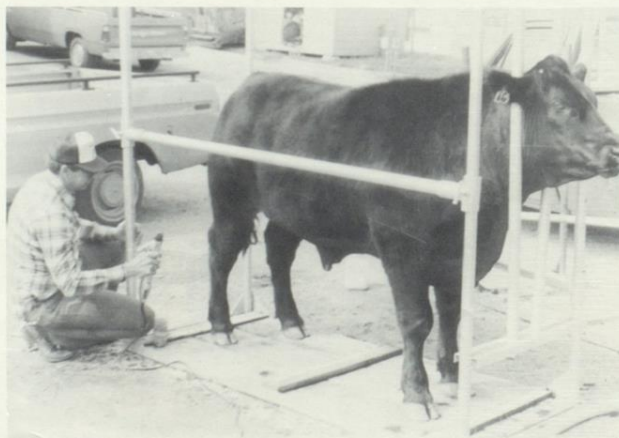

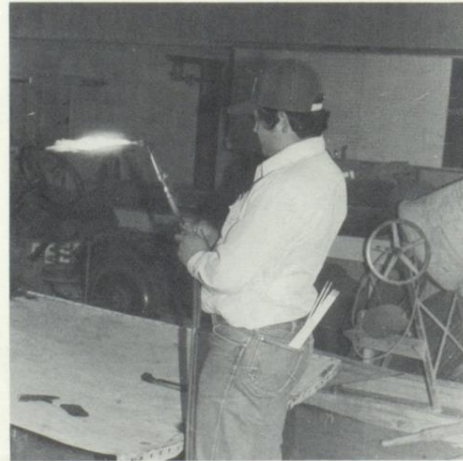

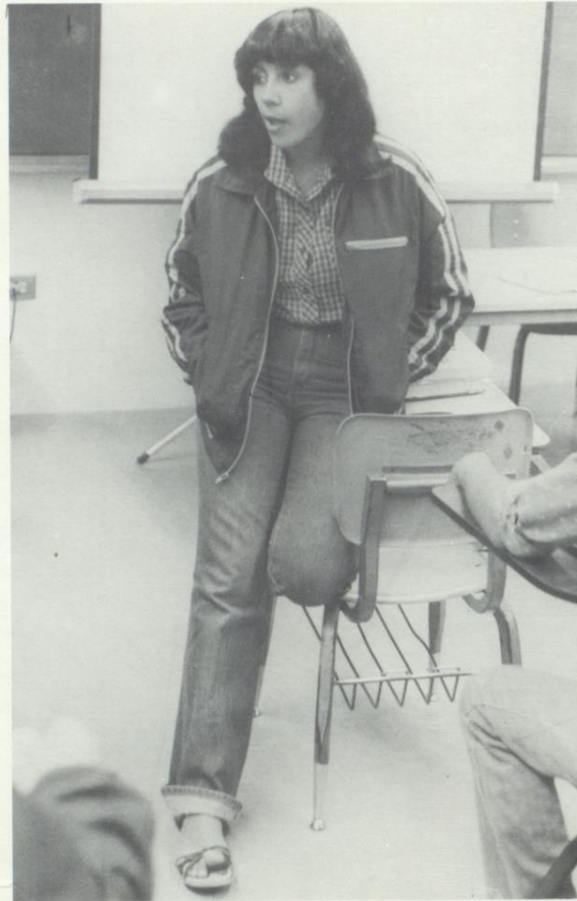
Outstanding Junior Gymnast

Tommy Kelly would also like to play professional ball. After playing just two years, he has decided he really likes the game. Tommy plays linebacker and tight end and is #84.

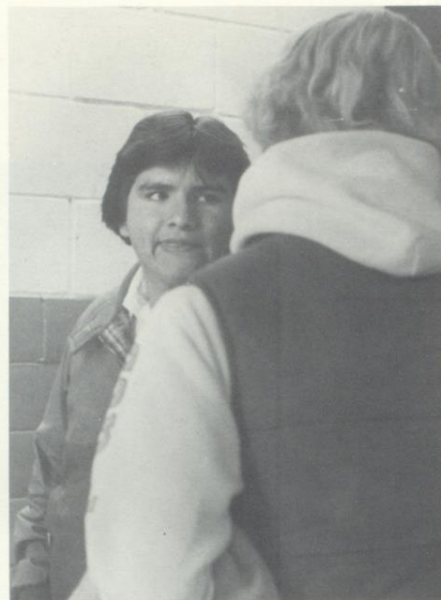
Sophomore kicker, Otto Moya, also played split end. He has played football for three years. He too wants a professional career but prefers baseball over football.

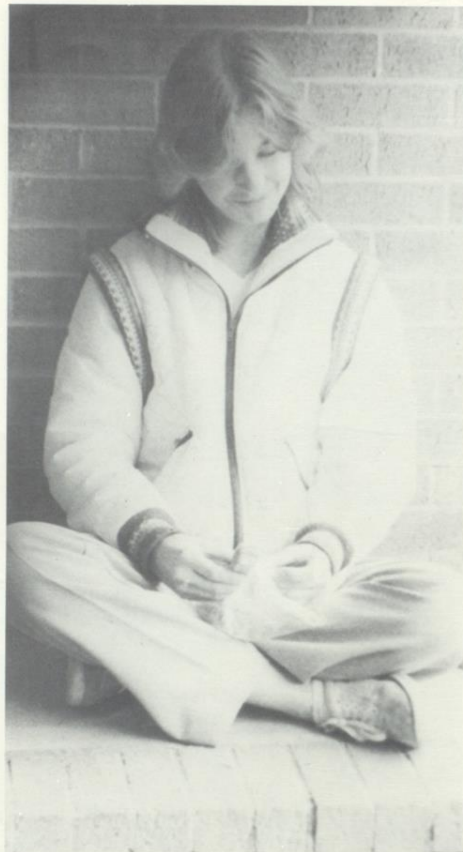

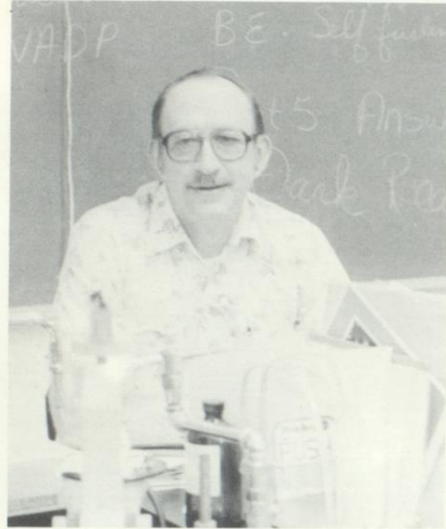
SPANISH

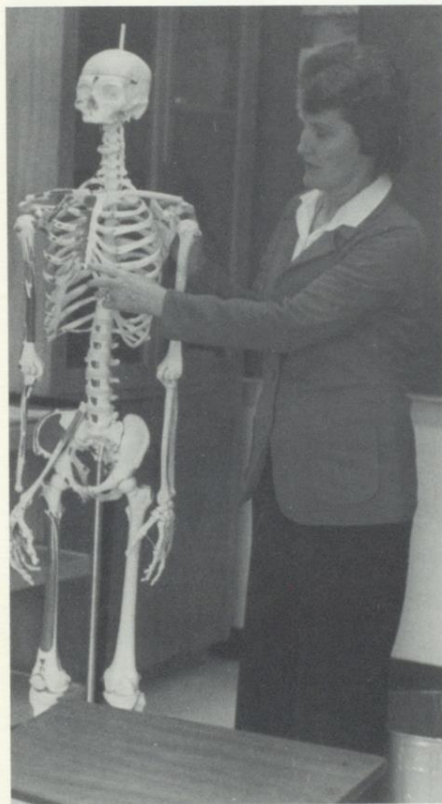

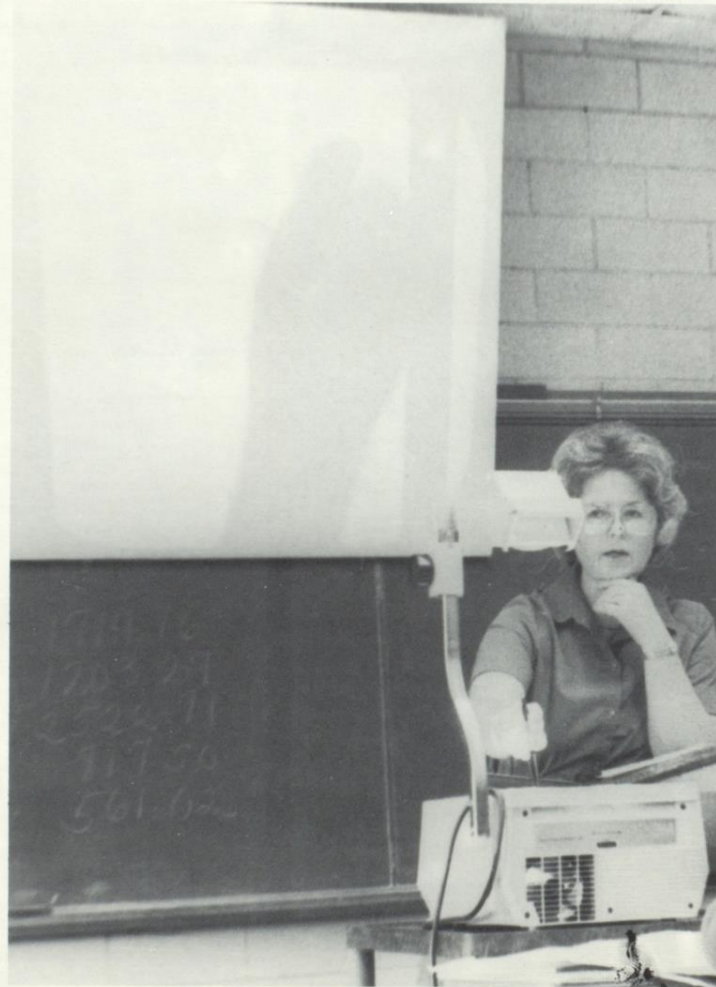

The Vocational Department, headed this year by Mr. Ed McKay, was started in 1967. A new building was designed specifically for this purpose. At that time there were ten departments with an enrollment of 512 students, about two-thirds of the total enrollment. Presently there are 19 units available with about 745 students taking part in vocational courses, still about two-thirds of the student body.

The Vocational Department was set up to help each student develop personal knowledge, skills, and competence to maximum capacity, and to learn behavior patterns which will make each a responsible member of society.

Some of the vocational courses are Production Agriculture, Useful Homemaking, Commercial Homemaking, Construction Trades, Auto Mechanics, Mechanical Repair, Distributive Education Co-op, Vocational Office Education, Printing, and Industrial Cooperative Training.

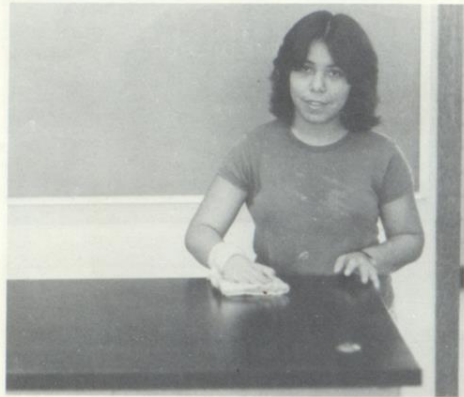
